# My Mission Trip to Mexico 2004

**A brief history** of the United Mexican States, aka Mexico. It is the third largest populated landmass in the Western hemisphere covering 761,000 square miles of land. Only 12% of the area is fertile land suitable for farming. The geography includes tropical forests, dry deserts & fertile valleys, varies from mountainous to [66%] plateaus ranging in elevation of 18,700 feet to 33 foot below sea level. Mexico has a Federal Republic form of government, with 31 States. The currency is peso, at the current exchange rate of one US dollar for 11.397 pesos. Rich in mining of silver, gold, copper, lead and other metals. Industry includes manufacturing of automobiles, farming, exports of coffee, cocoa, corn, oil & electricity, to name a few. Aztec Indians were prevalent to about 1521, currently other Indians still occupy much of the territory together with Spaniards. Mexico gained its Independence in 1821 from Spain. The symbol of Mexico is the Cuauhtemoc Indian. Life expectancy is 70+- years. The average GDP income per household is approximately \$8,000 per year. 40 % of the 105 billion population is under the poverty level. Mexico is the leading supplier of marijuana, meth & heroin.

**Purpose of the mission** trip was, to assist in building a sanctuary for church services & education facilities for the *OLD COLONY GERMAN MENNONITES*. Which immigrated to the Colonia Alvaro Obergon [Rubio], from Montreal Canada beginning in 1921. The MAPS PROJECT [Missionary Abroad Placement Service] initiated by the Assemblies of God Missions Department in Springfield, Mo., invited people from all walks of life, vocations, faiths and States as far away as Ohio, to become volunteers in the work. Construction workers, Evangelistic Teams, Medical Teams, Dental practitioners, Youth & Kids Ministry Teams, and translation were just a few areas that 120 men & women participated in. Some of these individuals served for two weeks, others came and served for one week. Subsequent groups will follow to complete the structure. The building encompasses nearly 6,200 square foot, a sanctuary, classrooms, dorm facilities, kitchen, laundry & offices. At the end of the second week, walls, concrete floor, structural steel roof members, waste plumbing, water supply lines and radiant hot water floor heat were intact. A crane came in to set heavy steel trusses. Many volunteers

had very little or no construction experience, prior to this work, however, teamwork & coordination achieved great success. Several youth learned the concepts of construction, including learning how to weld, plumbing etc. While the local German women prepared our lunch & evening meals, others were busy in their assigned areas. The day usually ended with a worship service, originated in either Spanish, German or English.

I had the great honor to translate English to German [my native tongue]. Breakfast was usually served at individual locations, as were the motels we stayed in. Good accommodations served for a restful night, often hot water for showers was a bit cramped to our stateside routine. When one serves on missions, the object is to be Patient, Flexible for change of our way of life, not to infringe on their ways of doing things. Most often their culture is much decelerated than ours. Changes can be made anytime, so these virtues are necessary.

**Culture & Faith**, vary from our own in our hometown. They even vary from camp to camp. Rubio area is largely a German settlement with 120 camps [or darps] each individually controlled by elders & ministers, religiously & legally. Each camp has about 640 acres and all participate in the chores of that area, even children. Most of the land is flood / row irrigated. Modern farm implements are present, often the rubber tires have been replaced with iron wheels. Horse and buggies are often used to go to town for shopping.

Schooling is in small one room buildings up through the age of 12, in High German. Reading, writing, math & singing compose the core of education. The Bible is used as text exclusively. We had the opportunity to visit one such school in session. Girls were dressed in long dresses, and headdress. Boys wore bib overalls and simple shirts, caps were hung on racks above the long desks, seating five each. Writing paper & pencils are in short supply in the classroom. Only a blackboard graces the front of the classroom. Discipline and order are evident, speaking only when asked. A water cooler with one cup placed at the back of the room furnished drinking water to the entire class.

The older folks speak High German, & plaute deitch [not low German], children speak plaute deitch & Spanish as well the older folks. Broken English is spoken by middle aged and younger

people. It is anticipated that when you finish six grades you are to help the parents in the farming routines. Many youth leave the colony, to achieve higher education and often excommunicated from family & the camp.

While the tenants of faith are deeply routed in the Bible, some scripture is taken out of text & context, and individually interpreted. Most believe that their salvation is obtained through good works, leaving the grace of Jesus Christ to be determined at the Great Judgment seat of Christ. To know otherwise is boasting, which is considered a sin.

Simplicity & cleanliness are strong tenants of their belief system. Alcoholism, incest, drug use and physical abuse are 4 times higher than in the local Mexican culture. Most abuses are not dealt with, and the Mexican Government hands are tied to interfere. To be an outsider and intrude, may put your life at risk. The Mennonites have long been granted exempt status from serving in the Military, & swearing of oaths, which continues to this day. It is said it is better to move and retrench than to adopt a modern social way of life.

Therefore; some evangelicals and missionaries are establishing places of worship to encourage a freer way of life, though Biblical teaching & deliverance from abuses. Often missionaries are resented, and purchase of lands to build, are difficult to obtain or made unavailable.

**My experience** in this of three mission trips, this one has opened my eyes to a larger world than I have here in Colorado. My heart has been enlarged with compassion & conviction. While refreshing many forgotten words in the German language, it was a rewarding experience to dialogue and minister to my kindred peoples. The humble honor to interpret the sermons & one on one was an experience that I shall never forget. This journey gave me greater insights to who I am, where I have been, and my rich heritage. I have concluded that when I was a child, I thought I was an oasis, but now I have learned there where others that were kin to the environment I was raised in and still exists today. As much as I enjoyed working with our group of volunteers, it was even a greater blessing to be ministered to by so many. If you ever have the opportunity to serve in this capacity, please prioritize your desire, you will be enriched beyond measure.
