Meeting Minutes

April 19, 2007

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 by President, Jon Lofstedt. Visitors included Rich Williams of Fort Collins who rides a ST-1100, Michelle Walbert who rides a Harley FLH, and Jim Mennier of Bailey who rides a Honda VTX-1800. Welcome to you all! Gary Davis of Church in the Wind gave the invocation in the absence of Chaplain Boots.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved without incident.

Treasurer, Floyd Thorne reported \$81.33 in cash, \$764.68 in checking, and \$65.50 in the Christmas Fund for a total of \$911.51. We will incur a fee of \$120.00 for web hosting.

Past Rides: Norm's Wild Goose Chase was well attended including a guest rider by the name of Michelle. Nobody seemed to know Michelle's last name, but she rode a Shadow. The Church in the Wind Bike Blessing saw nearly 400 people but only 6 bikes due to the snowy weather. There was plenty of food, and another blessing is scheduled for May 6th. An Open Ride on April 15th covered 241 miles and included Peak to Peak Highway, Estes Park, and Loveland. There were eight or so riders.

Upcoming Rides: The Fill In The Blanks Ride will be April 22nd and will cover about 135 miles of twisties with 25 blanks to fill in. Breakfast will be at 8:00am, with the first bikes out at 9:00.

1000-IN-24: Frank reported three entries so far. He said he finally got his SS1000 certificates from the Iron Butt Assn. for his ride to and from Iowa last year. We are still waiting for the items from the IBA for the 1000-IN-24 last year.

Safety: Bob Norton reminded us to be prepared for any weather condition. The weather in Colorado can change quickly, especially this time of year. Also, stay hydrated. Just because it's not real hot, it doesn't mean you don't need to drink water.

There was a discussion at the March meeting about wearables with one idea being an anniversary shirt commemorating our 25th year. Jon got some info on a very nice shirt from Fox Fire. A picture will be published in the next newsletter. We will need to order 20 or more for a price of about \$46/ea.

The Hankinson family sent their thanks to the FreeWheeler's for their support and love for Walt. Memorial patches for Walt will be available soon. A motion was made to rename the Rider of the Year trophy in Walt's name. The motion passed unanimously.

50/50: With a total of \$47 in the pot, Alan Hansher won \$23.50. Ron Hall got the free Christmas dinner.

Thumper won the Mental Meltdown Award. He was taking some great pictures with his new digital camera on a recent open ride. The only problem was that the data card for the camera was in the SD slot in his computer at home.

The motion to adjourn and get on with the bake sale was made at 8:23.

we were often times riding on wet roads where the rain had passed before us. There were also several occasions where we were getting sleet and snow in the air and on a couple occasions where we had to ride in the tracks to avoid the two to three inches of slush. Don't get me wrong, we had many hundreds of miles where the sun was shining beautifully. But even then, in most cases, just having the garments on was very comfortable without having them powered.

The moral of this part of the story is that if you like to ride all year long or even in the early spring and later fall seasons you can be as comfortable as you desire. Just dial the thermostat to your desired level of comfort and enjoy the ride. I felt that my garments actually paid for themselves on this trip alone.

I also recently purchased a refurbished Garmin 2610 GPS unit. I have always been a little envious of the fellows that have them (not necessarily the 2610 but rather any GPS model.) I know around town you just have to key in an address and it will take you there without having to use a map or a lot of trial and error. On a trip like this one you could key in the next major city you plan to travel to and it gives you the route, distance to the next turn and total mileage to that destination. It enables you to plan your gas stops and get more distance out of each tank because you know what towns are out in front of you and how far they are away.

It also, when zoomed into a pretty close view, enables you to see the route over the rise and around the bend which enables you to position yourself ready to setup and take the next bend in the road. I certainly can't use it to the extent that some in our group could, but I hope to be able to very soon. It was sure fun though to see the route just as they did and know where we were going and how long it would take to get there.

I had been to Canada in 2005 and was well aware of the beauty of the Canadian Rockies and longed to get back up there. Of course on this trip we were able to see even more of the beautiful country that we did in 2005. If you have never had the opportunity to see British Columbia and the western side of Alberta, I strongly recommend that you include it in your vacation plans in the future.

We saw some of the most beautiful and LARGE rivers that I had ever seen. Most of them literally make our South Platte look like a stream. With all that beautiful water almost everywhere it was surprising to me not to see more boating or other human activity. I could not help but think that living right there, that many

people take it all for granted just as many people take our beautiful Colorado mountains for granted, and don't get up there often to enjoy them.

There are not many people that you know that can say they have been to Alaska, EVER, let alone to have ridden there on a motorcycle. I have not been in all of the "Lower 48" as they say "YET", but I can color in Alaska on my cloth patch of states having been to. I had a wonderful time and it was a GREAT experience and opportunity. Would I do it again? – In a heartbeat. Maybe not next year, like many folks have, but I will be back!

I would like to say thank you to my traveling companions for their knowledge in the areas of navigation and the ways of long distance touring, as well as for their fellowship and camaraderie. I look forward to traveling with each and every one of you again one day soon.
